























Rome























Pompeii




On a lighter note, did you know the city of Pompeii is covered in penises? I didn't till I got there - they left that part out in class.













Athens

Greece had the best food of my trip by far. Everything i ate was so tasteful and enjoyable. I fell in love with the food here and I would go back just to eat there again.











Santorini












Luxor


